

Balderton Methodist Church: Community Café and Redevelopment Project

In January 2020, the good people at Balderton Methodist Church (now the Wesley Centre at Balderton Methodist Church) formally applied for listed building approval to refurbish and alter their suite of buildings as part of their project entitled; Community Café and Redevelopment Project. Their clear Mission Statement stated:



We are a journeying Christian community, open to all, offering hospitality on the way, promoting community well-being, exploring spirituality and sharing the love of Jesus with all.

In order to put their vision into practice they wanted to create a warm, comfortable meeting place for all ages that had very few places to network/socialise with level access to all areas. They wanted to develop a modern, well-equipped space with comfy seating where they can provide an inexpensive coffee shop with homemade cakes and light lunches at affordable prices. This would include the provision of 'afternoon teas' for elderly folk (as part of our continuing Befriending Network) as they recognised that in these days many elderly folk feel lonely, isolated and disenfranchised from their families and friends. With knowledgeable friendly volunteers the refurbished church would be a place to find gentle support at what can be a demanding and isolating time.

Consultation on the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme

Some of you (particularly those of you who look after Historic Buildings) will know of the Government's VAT grant scheme, which refunds VAT which has been spent maintaining or repairing a listed place of worship. The official name of the scheme is the [Listed](#)



[Places of Worship Grant Scheme \(LPOWGS\)](#). The DCMS, the Government Department which funds the LPOWGS has recently publicised the scheme's impact, and can be seen as a marker of the importance attached to historic buildings by the Government. [Click here to learn more.](#)

The Methodist Church inputs into the running of the scheme, and following the 2023 upgrade, would like to hear from you with any suggestions as to how to

Also, if you have any comments on how the LPOWS plays into cash flow planning for larger projects then we would also like to hear from you. If you have within the last couple of years carried out a project to a listed place of worship of total cost of, say, £50k or more then we would be interested to hear from you. We'd like to know roughly the time gap between finalising your estimate of total likely cost, and the point when you completed your fund raising as well as the time gap between completing fund-raising and paying the final bill. God For All

Have you ever wanted some inspiration of what could happen in your church? If so you may wish to sign up for the God for All newsletter. Last month's newsletter shared these highlights from pioneer Ali Mansfield's story, shared at Whole Hearted:

"I had no team and no plan. From the start I got to know those around me, visiting community groups, bringing people together and finding out who wanted to be part of this calling. We have come to love bringing people together without feeling the need to fix them. From spending time with three ladies in the park with a flask of coffee, we now see 20+ gathering each week in the pub where the landlord – well, at first, he really wasn't sure of me. It's been deep listening, sincerity, transparency and getting to know others without an agenda.



We are covered in prayer - there are many who aren't part of the community ministry but they feel called to pray for us, which is our bedrock. It took three years of prayer for our first gentleman. The unchurched are asking questions, people are coming to faith. And hundreds are watching from afar. There is a growing desire from others to know God, questions are asked, religion being stripped away, preconceived ideas about the church are being torn down. Three unique conversations and a stranger's Facebook post led to forming our grief group; someone's skill in baking led to a ministry in cupcakes and combating loneliness; a volunteer with a passion for cooking led to dinner church...these are just some examples of the GOD-incidences.

Today we have a growing faith community, [growing community groups](#) and a small established Dinner Church where we have more children than adults. We have people with faith and no faith all gathering around the table where Jesus fulfills our spiritual hunger. Is our ministry clear cut, mapped out, tracking growth? NO. It's messy, it's unpredictable, it's chaotic and at times it's disheartening... but is God in it? YES. The Holy Spirit left our building years ago - and we, who are out on the streets of the community, have front row seats to God being everywhere."

Good news! Funding is available for Yorkshire's Churches

[The Yorkshire Historic Churches Trust](#) is welcoming funding applications from places of worship across the county for repair, restoration and maintenance work. Due to the generous donations and legacies received last year, the Trust is



actively encouraging churches to apply for the next round of funding.

The application deadlines for 2024 are **Friday 8 March** for consideration at the April grants committee and **Friday 23 August** for consideration at the October grants committee. For guidance and how to apply please click to:

Grants are available for repairs to the church fabric, the walls, roofs, floors, tower, bell frames, windows, stonework, repointing and rainwater goods. Grants are also available for the conservation of fixture and fittings, such as monuments, furniture and stained glass and repairs to bells, clocks and organs.

Applications are also welcome for investigatory work, eg where a cherry picker may be required to assess what repairs may be required. You can apply for this type of grant at any time of the year. Do contact Jonathan Stamp by email at grants@yhct.org.uk if you would like to discuss this.

The YHCT have no set funding amounts, but common grants range from £2000 - £10,000, depending on the size of the works. The Grant Committee looks at how much the total project is and how much effort has gone into fund raising locally, and which other funders have been approached or confirmed their grants. The YHCT ideally likes to be able to help a church or chapel who have neared the end of their fund raising and only have a shortfall of say £10 - £15,000 to be able to start their project. We look forward to hearing from you.






Property Stewards' Handbook

As Christians we are called to care for God's creation and to work for justice in the world. We are currently living in a climate emergency which threatens much of the life on earth and disproportionately affects those people who did least to cause it.

The Methodist Church in Britain has set a target of net zero by 2030. This will require action in a number of different areas and contexts, but crucial to achieving this aim will be ensuring that the energy we use is green, renewable energy.

Moving to using green electricity not only ensures that the energy we use does as little as possible to contribute to the climate emergency but also allows us to demonstrate collectively that we, as a Church, want to see the building of greater capacity for renewable energy.

As well, we are aware of the concern that churches have regarding rising energy costs. One possible option for managing trustees to consider would be to get in touch with an energy broker who may be able to fix your rates for a period of time. Although it is not always guaranteed that the rate is cheaper, there is a level of security of having a fixed rate. Managing Trustees could also contact other churches in their circuit and/or district to see if they might be interested, as sometimes brokers can offer deals for a cluster of churches.
