Back to the Heart of Worship

Recently, with a couple of colleagues, I've been reviewing and updating one of the key modules of Worship: Leading & Preaching, the training course for local preachers and worship leaders. Parts of the course are nearly 10 years old now, and well due for a refresh!

Reviewing the section called "Focus on Worship" has been a surprisingly moving task, and has given me much pause for thought. Maybe it's because in the post-lockdown world, I'm so much aware just how wonderful it is to worship together. Maybe also because of conversations about whether it's really possible to worship online. Or maybe like many people, both within the church and well outside its orbit, I'm aware of an unmistakeable urge to worship, and a sense of loss if an opportunity to worship passes by.

Perhaps it's inevitable that people are drawn towards worship, especially in a time that is so full of anxiety and disruption. James K A Smith says "Christian worship is nothing less than an invitation to participate in the life of the triune God." What a privilege we have to be those called to pass that invitation to others. And then, to welcome to them to a place where a transformational encounter with the Divine can take place. Never again should preparation for worship become another chore to be completed on a Saturday evening...

Worship in our churches needs to take place in a safe, welcoming and hospitable environment and I would draw your attention to the importance of safeguarding training and the letter below. Advanced Safeguarding Training

By the time you read this, the extended deadline for all Local Preachers and Worship Leaders to have completed the Advanced Safeguarding Module (31st August) will have passed. The Connexional Safeguarding Team are aware that some people may have had difficulty accessing the training, and wrote to all Superintendent Ministers and Local Preachers' Secretaries recently. If you are affected by this, please speak to your Superintendent so they can contact the Safeguarding Team. The text of the letter is here:

Dear colleagues,

You will be aware that the Methodist Conference decided that all local preachers and worship leaders needed to undertake the Advanced Safeguarding Module and allowed a period of four years for this to be achieved. Due to the Covid pandemic, face to face training was suspended and an extension to the deadline for completion was agreed by the Secretary of Conference and chair of the Safeguarding Committee. This extension comes to an end on 31 August. We are very grateful to all those who have now benefited from undertaking the training and all the trainers who have worked hard to develop and deliver both face to face and now online training opportunities as well. We recognise that in a few areas access to training by the August deadline has proven difficult for some local preachers and worship leaders. As completion of this training is necessary for continuing to preach and lead worship, plan making has become even more challenging. If you as superintendent are in this situation in your circuit, please contact the Safeguarding team at safeguarding@methodistchurch.org.uk explaining the problem and the steps you have taken to resolve it, and any help that you need so we can advise on the best way for your local preachers and worship leaders to access the required training.





The Year of Isaiah

This year, Bible Month is focussing on the key book of Isaiah, which is right at the centre of the Bible and at the heart of its message. Isaiah speaks of the justice and mercy of God and points the way to Jesus.

Tackling Isaiah might seem a daunting prospect. Bible Notes author Helen Paynter has picked out four key themes which help unpack Isaiah's message in accessible way. Preaching points are suggested, and ideas for small groups to discuss. There are ideas for all-age and intergenerational worship too.

Small Groups

Be invitational – consider how you will invite people to join your small group when it starts. Once it's going, will it be a 'closed' group to allow safe spaces to share, or will you continue to allow new people to join?

If the former, make sure you have new groups for newcomers. If the latter, you may need to issue personal invitations, and make sure everyone is comfortable with newcomers, and gets to know one another.

WLP Online Induction

In other news...

A new version of the **Guide to Portfolios** is available (Issue 4) which describes better the way that portfolios are assessed and moderated in version 3. This is available on the course website and on the WLP3 page on the Methodist website **here**.

The **Project Workspace User Guides** for Students and Tutors have also been updated and can be downloaded from the course website or the WLP3 webpage.

There is a new process for **Accreditation of Prior Experience and Learning (APEL)**. This is designed for people who have recently completed a formal educational qualification in theology, mission or ministry and can result in exemption from specific aspects of the Worship: Leading & Preaching course. Hot Tip for students: When you start a new module-section, look at the **Project Brief** first. Then, as you work through **Learn** you can jot down ideas for your project as you go. There's nothing to stop you sending a first draft of your project to your Tutor for their feedback as soon as it's ready.



WLP Summer School

We met again at Cliff College this summer for the relaunch of Summer School. We were fewer in number than previously, but had a great time exploring theology and worshipping together. Summer School 2023 is provisionally booked in for 31st July -4th August 2023, more details to follow when confirmed.

Explore Online

Having run a Zoom alternative to Summer School four times now, the time has come for a change. Explore Online will run on **four weekends** in 2022-23. Each weekend will start on Friday evening at around 7pm, and run through to Saturday afternoon (around 3pm).

During the weekend, the Explore sessions for one complete module will be held. Each of the eight modules will be covered once during the year, so a student starting the course in September would be able to complete the Explore sessions for all eight modules in two years. Note that you still need a local Tutor and Mentor to support you during the course, and must have completed the online Learn material before doing Explore Online for that module.

Worship: Leading & Preaching in a Year

We will be running this programme for the third time, starting this September. It offers an opportunity to complete the Worship: Leading & Preaching course in a Year. It requires a high level of commitment from you as a student (and from your local Tutor and Mentor), but this may be just right for you if you have a

strong sense of God's call and the opportunity and inclination to commit to intensive study. Explore sessions are provided either residentially at Cliff College or on Zoom.

Please note that you still require a Tutor and a Mentor in your local circuit to participate in this programme, and that your circuit needs to be fully involved in your training.

Footnote



Just as I've been pondering on worship, and how we provide the best opportunities for worship we possibly can, preaching has also been on my mind.

Something rather subtle happened during the recent pandemic. Those of us who were involved leading worship online realised that it was possible to say in five minutes what previously had taken ten. Or in ten, what had previously taken twenty. In many ways, that was a great lesson to learn - as preachers, we had to learn to be clear and succinct, and to hold attention in a virtual world where minds wander (even) more easily.

But there was a down side. Sermons tended to shrink into homilies, and homilies into short reflections. Very valuable and appropriate in context, especially in an online world, but maybe not all that a congregation look for from the preacher. My concern is that the trend for short, compact, "lite" has become the norm now we're onsite, and preaching is one casualty. Many invitation letters now seem to set a service duration of 30 minutes as the expectation, where previously an hour would be set aside for worship.

This isn't an argument for long, complicated sermons - after all preaching can take many forms: it can be multi-generational, conversational, use stories, drama and mixed media. But whatever form preaching takes, it is often the only opportunity the gathered people get to think about and engage with faith in the midst of busy lives. Preaching (together with singing) has always been in Methodist communities their primary ways to engage with theology. That's even more the case now that small groups are so hard to find. So here's a challenge to those of us who preach: let's be confident as we proclaim God's Word and remind the church of the saving grace we find in Jesus Christ.

Preach the word; be prepared in season and out of season; correct, rebuke and encourage—with great patience and careful instruction. (2 Tim 4:2, NIV).
