
As I follow You today Lord, let me, Your creation discover how to be creative.

Oh, how I love your law...?


As Christians who emphasise God's love and grace, how can God's Law be at the centre of our faith?

Bible Month 2024 - Genesis


Open the Bible and Genesis is the first book you find. It's the foundation on which the whole of scripture is built. It sets the scene for all that happens afterwards, and asks some big questions: Who is God? How can we possibly know God? Does God care? Yet for preachers, it's sometimes hard to know how to preach from Genesis with integrity and faith.

We have explored the climax of the story of salvation in Revelation, now it's back to the beginning to rediscover the roots of our faith. When the 2021 Conference adopted The Theology of Safeguarding report, they recognised that we all need to think through how the Bible and our faith underpin safeguarding.

A set of resources are about to be published, consisting of a four-session study guide with short films, activities and questions for discussion and reflection. There is also a Reader's and Facilitator's Guide.

These help us to look at our Christian calling which offers a welcome to all, whilst ensuring that our worship and wider church life is safe for everyone.

When the study guide was piloted earlier this year, the feedback was overwhelmingly positive:


Last winter, as their sabbatical project, Jill and Andrew Baker spent time reflecting on the theme of **Winter Light**, the result being a set of resources for use by churches and individuals.

There are 10 short PowerPoint presentations for the 10 Sundays from

Advent Sunday 2023 through to Candlemas 2024 (3rd Dec 2023 – 4th Feb 2024). Each presentation lasts about 5 minutes and includes a short video introducing the theme, using a few verses from the Epistle to the Hebrews, one verse of a hymn

and a prayer, all illustrated with images from the Scottish Highlands. The presentations begin with a brief verse and response which, during the weeks of Advent, includes the lighting of Advent candles.

Prayers for each day of the month, together with a set of suggested readings for each day of the year, which are also the basis for the daily **Word in Time** reflections.



WLP Developments

Moodle (the platform on which the WLP website is built) is provided for us by the Church of England. Recently, two significant upgrades have taken place. Firstly, the server computers on which the site runs were changed. More recently the Moodle software has been upgraded to the latest version.

You may notice some visual changes, mainly that the navigation menus are now on the left and the "Show/Hide Block" buttons have gone. There are now semi-circular "tabs" which allow you to show and hide the menus at the left and right sides of the screen. I hope you like the changes.

Also there is a new version of Module 2 containing updated and refreshed content. If you're starting Module 2, please use the new version. If you're already working through Module 2, you can continue with the old version which will be available until Easter 2024.

Hot Tip for Students:

Starting a new project can be daunting. You may have a number of ideas and not know what direction to go with your exploration.

Don't be afraid to ask your Tutor's guidance and suggestions early. You could outline your various ideas and have a conversation with them.

Remember, each project is for you to show that you have engaged with the topic, reflected on it, and can communicate what you've learned.

Your tutor is looking for signs of your growth and development.

The moderators are looking for evidence that you and your tutor have engaged in helpful dialogue as you've been studying.

Footnote



As Advent approaches the nights are closing in and the temperature is plummeting. Lighting Advent candles week by week seems an appropriate response – we need light, and the flickering of a candle provides a seed of hope and promise. The world around us seems especially dark this year. The conflicts, crises and suffering of so many seem very close and hope seems very fragile. Perhaps it was in a time like this that Isaiah the prophet wrote these words: ... the people living in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned (Isaiah 9:2).

I wonder how Isaiah understood those words? For Matthew, who quotes them in his gospel, they had a fresh meaning. He saw that this light, promised in darkness, had come. The light of Christ, shining into the lives of people like his own, had completely changed his perspective. The darkness was still there – persecution and poverty still oppressed many and Christians themselves were on the run. But a light had appeared, and where there's light, there's hope.

Perhaps our job as preachers is to hold that light, so that people can catch a glimmer of hope. To hold the light and encourage people to move toward it, and seek out the things of God. To hold the light so that people can still see possibilities, even in days of trouble, and persevere. To hold the light, so that people remember that they don't need to hang onto every word of crisis they hear through news channels or social media, and can look towards the One who ...was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. (John 1:4-5).

There's a lot of darkness around at the moment. But the light has dawned – let us be guided by that light as we travel on.

Every blessing for the season of Advent.
