Grants for Building Energy Audits (England)

Why get an energy audit for your church building?

Energy audits are a useful tool for learning how best to make church buildings more sustainable, both in terms of energy efficiency and in terms of reducing energy costs. More grant providers, such as [the Benefact Trust](#) and [National Churches Trust](#), are offering grants that support energy efficiency adaptations. An energy audit is a useful tool for giving evidence to support grant applications.



The new £10million [Community Energy Fund \(CEF\)](#) will initially be based upon the same criteria as the previous Rural Community Energy Fund, although will be opened up to applicants from urban areas. The aim of the fund is to help kick start projects including small-scale wind farms and rooftop solar partnerships, as well as battery storage, rural heat networks, electric vehicle charging points, and fuel poverty alleviation schemes - all proposed, designed and owned by local people.



Update from TMCP

New Matter Management System

Over the last few years TMCP, together with external consultants, has been developing a new Matter Management System (MMS). As a result of the time and resources that have been invested, the project is now nearing its conclusion and the core functionality of the MMS was implemented at the end of September 2023 with training take place for the whole TMCP Team over 2nd and 3rd October 2023. Regeneration in Malton



Methodism is a part of Malton's history; it has been central to the political and social evolution of the town since the mid-18th century. The first Methodist Church was established in Old Maltongate, and Methodism's founder John Wesley, preached there during the 1770's; having outgrown the first Church, a deal was struck with the 4th Earl Fitzwilliam, bartering this for a new larger site, and the Saville Street Church opened in 1811. Almost a perfect cube in form, the 'new' 700

seater Church, was designed as an auditory ‘preaching house’ by William Jenkins, and was built by public subscription.

However, given the costs associated with its duty of care to maintain the listed building, the Church Council commenced discussions in the summer of 2015 to reconsider the future for its building; this included a sale attempt (for the third time in its 208-year history), a partial re-purposing, or permanent closure/mothballing. Serious structural issues within the roof space were first identified in a quinquennial inspection during September 2015 – and this challenge focused minds. After reviewing five different options during late 2015, including sale or permanent closure, the Church Council unanimously decided to explore the most ambitious plan: to use its historic building as a much needed community resource in the heart of Malton. PAT Testing- Busting the myths

There are many myths about PAT but you can use [HSE's frequently asked questions](#) to find the key facts about the inspection and testing of portable electrical equipment.





Building volunteers: a survey of volunteers in the Diocese of Ely

This is an important piece of research recently carried out by the Historic Religious Buildings Alliance (2023). It talks of the need to recognise the contribution made by our church volunteers and to provide them with the necessary support and training needed to carry out their roles. Whilst the survey is of volunteers in Anglican buildings there is much we can learn relating to our own experiences in the Methodist Church. This includes the need for concise information to avoid overwhelming people as well as the need to review the key leadership roles and their relevance to modern attitudes to volunteering.




- Do we consider that our volunteers' responsibilities, duties and expectations are appropriate, realistic or indeed fair?
- Is there sufficient financial and practical support to ensure those who volunteer in areas like property and routine maintenance feel they can carry out this role to the standards expected of them?
- Is it a crisis of numbers but also a lack of a positive volunteering experience for people?
- Is the lack of volunteers a greater threat to historic church buildings than a lack of funding?

There is much to learn from the research. It is important to recognise that some of our churches are looking at creative and innovative ways of providing positive volunteering experiences such as working with Friends' Groups, and encouraging those who, whilst not wishing to attend worship, care about and want to help us look after our buildings. A new way to support churches: The Bridge Circuit



Green Church Awards



Annual Returns Update

We have made some significant changes to the Annual Returns update to help make it more efficient and relevant to the current needs of the wider Church. One of the most significant changes users will notice is the drastic reduction in the number of questions. The feedback from managing



trustees over the years has been consistent: there were too many questions being asked on the portal. The questions now focus on Action for Hope and the mission of churches and circuits. These questions will be fed in to the work that the Connexional Team does and help assess the impact of these initiatives.

However, the questions that were previously on the return have not entirely gone away. They now form [The Managing Trustee Annual Returns Checklist \(Word\)](#) or [\(pdf version\)](#). This makes it easier for us to adapt the questions as the needs of the church change over time, but also make it easier for you to submit the information to your circuits and districts, but also store them for your own records.

[The Managing Trustee Annual Returns Checklist \(Word\)](#) or [\(pdf version\)](#) contains questions that used to appear within the annual returns checklist. However, although they been removed, they may still assist you in fulfilling your obligations as a managing trustee. Please note that this is not a complete list, merely guidance to ensure that you keep in mind certain areas of responsibility on an annual basis. It is suggested that reference should be made to specific District or Circuit requirements.

- **23 January 2024** - Deadline for paper is 31 December 2023
- **23 April 2024** - Deadline for paper is 22 March 2024
- **16 July 2024** - Deadline for paper is 14 June 2024
