# Hello from Zambia!

Warm greetings from a hot and sunny Zambia. Andrew (Malcolm's son) arrived in time for his birthday on 5th October. They spent a few days together before going to pick up Luyando and Chipo for the week long half term break. The twins have settled in well and are enjoying their last term as primary Students. Chengelo school is around 200miles north from Lusaka where we live. It takes around five or six hours and some of the road is far from great!

#### Gina's work....

Before half term, Gina faced a long and arduous trip to the western part of Zambia. She joined a group of American volunteer doctors for a couple of days at one of the two major United Church of Zambia (UCZ) hospitals that form part of her work as the Health Secretary. She greatly enjoyed the clinical practice although not the journey to Mwandi hospital which

includes miles of road where it is necessary to travel alongside the broken up road... After treasuring time with Zambian and American clinicians, she journeyed north for a board meeting at Arthur Wina Clinic.. a round trip of around 1600 Km (almost 1000miles) a third of which is on road where there is more pot hole than tar!

Gina has been in the post of Health Secretary for over a year. She enjoys the variety and challenge of the work. A day can include meeting sometimes face to face and often on ZOOM with Synod officials (Synod Bishop, General Secretary, Presbytery bishops and Administrative Secretary) to visiting/contacting the Ministry of Health or CHAZ (Churches Health Association of Zambia) or the various hospital and clinic administrators and staff. Then there are six monthly board meetings at the two hospitals and seven clinics involving travelling north, south east and west throughout Zambia. Normally she takes the car with the help of a Synod driver, sometimes she has flown. To enable her to maintain the hands on nursing that she loves, Gina has arranged to do some voluntary nursing at the University Teaching hospital. In February Gina will be in the UK to enable her to ensure she can attend the necessary courses, necessary for revalidation when the time comes.

Recently Gina organised a seminar/workshop in the Capital which the Administrators/ lead staff from all nine facilities attended. This was a great opportunity to engage in team building and enabling collaborative working. Guest speakers were invited to provide input relevant to encourage all the facilities to develop both clinically and structurally. The Synod Bishop also attended.

So the last weeks of his official Superintendency were conducted via ZOOM and WhatsApp from Zambia.

The Methodist Church, Global Relationships office have classed Malcolm as an 'Accompanying Volunteer' not a formal Mission Partner. Malcolm is very happy to have this flexibility.

Alongside Malcolm's calling to Ministry.. he also has experience and expertise in things related to mechanical engineering. He hopes to pursue these in his retirement. Malcolm was delighted therefore recently to join the technical person from the project department and a maintenance engineer from a UCZ Secondary school to explore how best to help Masuku Clinic and School improve their water supply. Malcolm has a real heart for Masuku not least as in the 1980's he was Consistory Chair (Superintendent) there.

## A greatly appreciated visit...

We were greatly blessed by a visit from the recently appointed Partnership Coordinator for Africa Revd Dr Andrew Ashdown. We are so appreciative that Revd Andrew travelled with Gina to visit the two major hospitals and some of the smaller clinics. # **Appreciation**


