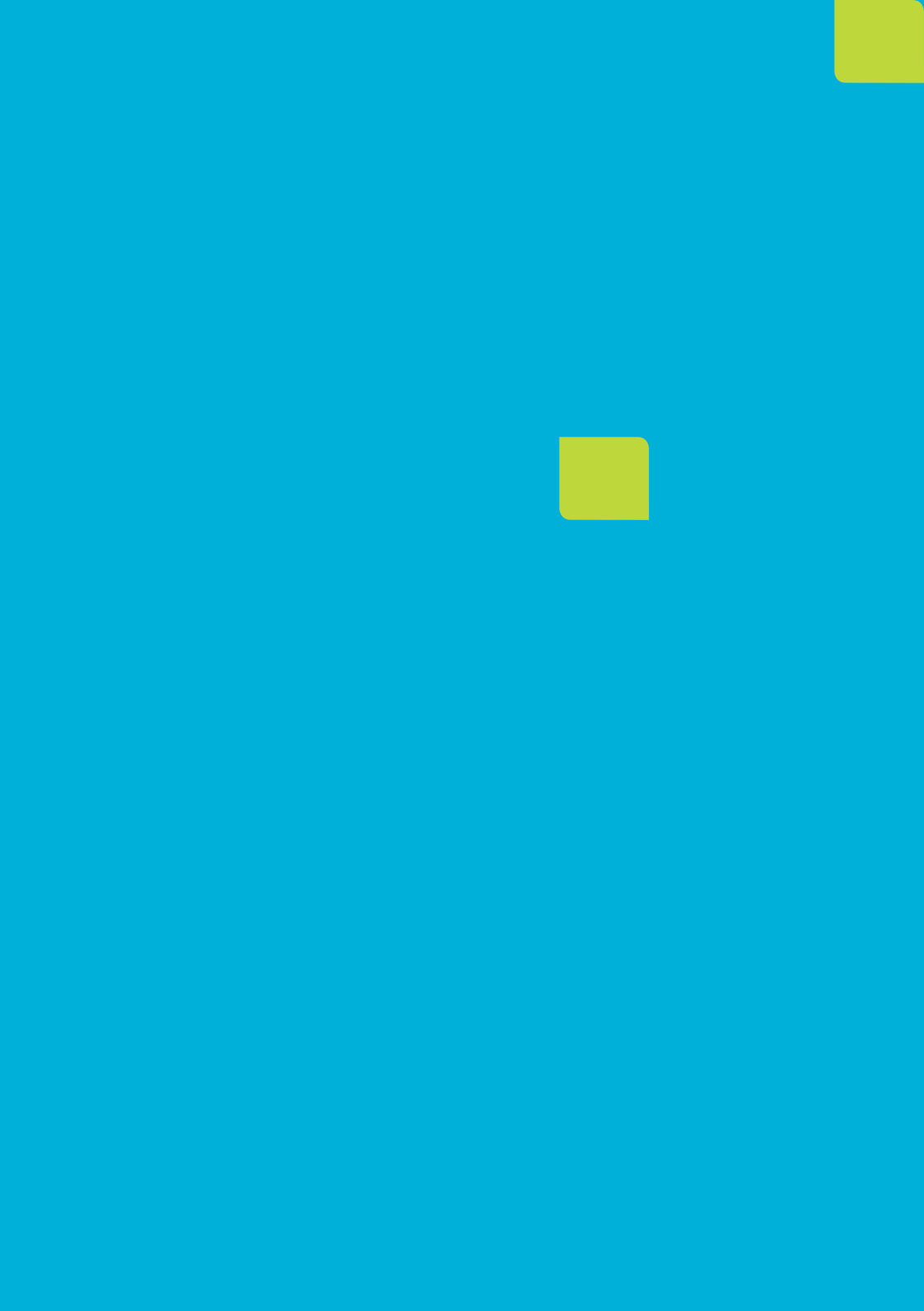

But as for that in the good soil, these are the ones who, when they hear the word, hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bear fruit with patient endurance.*

## A Message From Mark Wakelin, Secretary for Internal Relationships

## What is Participation and What Can It Do For Us?

Lynne Norman, Participation Project Manager for the Midlands, has worked for the charity Changemakers. In her work for Youth For Christ she was responsible for communication strategy. Lynne is also a volunteer youth group leader in her local church.

Rachel Quinlan, Participation Project Manager South East, has had extensive experience working overseas and as a schools worker in the south east. Originally trained as an engineer, she is a very handy woman to have around when things break!

Emma Paton, Children's Participation Worker, is based at Methodist Church House. Emma has been developing the Church's resources for encouraging the participation of children at all levels. Emma ran a very successful '11 Million Takeover' day event when hundreds of children and young people 'took over' Methodist Church House for a day. They got involved in everything, from operating the phones and helpdesk to advising web designers and mission partners.

This workshop briefly introduces 'Hope In God's Future', the climate change report that went to Conference 2009. Using Godly Play we will identify some of the theological themes that underpin a Christian concern to act responsibly in the light of the scientific evidence of climate change. We will mind-map and create a montage of ways our lifestyles are contributing to a high carbon footprint, and then identify practical actions to live well and reduce our carbon footprint in our lifestyles, in our churches and in our communities.

She worked with the Joint Public Issues Team to write the accompanying study guide to the report to Conference on climate change. Helen currently works as a freelance community dance artist, teaching for the Royal Academy of Dance, the Language of Dance Trust, All Souls Clubhouse Community Centre and Southwest School of Ballet. She has also taught and performed with Esther's Journey Dance Company, the Spring Harvest dance team, and at churches and Christian events across the UK.

## Listening to Christians in Palestine

Facilitator: Dr Richard Vautrey

Richard will discuss his recent visit with the President of the Conference, David Gamble to Israel/Palestine where he met Palestinian Christians and Church leaders, and saw the work of the Ecumenical Accompaniers Programme in Palestine and Israel. He will share their experiences and talk about how daily life for ordinary Palestinians has been affected by the creation of the separation barrier between Israel and Palestine.

### About the facilitator:

Dr Richard Vautrey is currently the Vice-President of the Methodist Conference. He is a GP in Leeds and the Deputy Chair of the British Medical Association GP committee and he has continued in both of these roles as normal during his year of office.

Richard is married to Anne and has two school-age sons. He is a local preacher and a former mission partner in Nigeria.

### Youth Participation Strategy (YPS)

We're embarked on an ambitious programme of youth participation development across the country. Building on Conference's decision in 2008 to make this a real priority, we are leading the way among the major denominations.

We've appointed five Youth Participation Project Managers, and we've set up a new gap-year scheme for young people called The One Programme – which already has 14 young people working in varied projects across the country (see overleaf).

## The One Programme

As part of the YPS, we've set up The One Programme, giving young people the opportunity to work for a year in their local churches and districts in creative projects that help to show Jesus to others. These young people are known as OPPs (One Programme Participants). The One Programme is about ...

### ... individuals

Each OPP will participate in a programme of work tailored specifically to them and their development, believing that, as one person, they can make a difference.

### ... time

Each OPP commits just one year of their life to the One Programme, working to make a difference to the future for which we hope and pray.

### ...place

Each OPP will be rooted in one place, right where they live, enabling them and those they work with to achieve something real, deep and long-lasting.

# Chaplaincy in the Methodist Church

Chaplaincy is ...



... an ancient tradition.

St Martin of Tours (4th Century) was a Roman Army Officer who encountered a destitute man near the gates of Amiens and cut his army cloak (capella) in half in order to share it. He became known as the first 'capellain' or 'chaplain'. After ordination, he was commissioned to work away from the main church building in places where people were in special need. Buildings created for this special work were known as chapels!!

So, from the beginning, chaplains have had a particular pastoral and practical care for people in critical need.

They work where people are not waiting for others to come to them, and they are ready to make themselves vulnerable, having only half a cloak left. Martin, incidentally, began his ministry as a lay person.



... part of the ministry of Jesus.

The gospels make only three references to Jesus being in the temple and one of him in a synagogue at Nazareth. Apart from these, the ministry of Jesus is conducted largely outside the confines of the gathered community of faith. This is a context that chaplains recognise as they follow their call to discipleship, living out the gospel in word and deed, making real the ministry of Jesus in our time and place.



... in the tradition of John Wesley.

Our origins and self-understanding as a Church are essentially missional. Chaplains (amongst others) essentially have a 'sent' status – conferred by the Church – representative of the Church and the whole Christian cause. Chaplains may have a prophetic role to speak a word of caution and to encourage reform – creating the kingdom of God.



... living and working in a plural world.

Most chaplains now work in a multi faith environment. This is not an option, it is a necessity, and can also be a blessing.

Most chaplaincy also engages with people who do not know the Christian story or have any structured spiritual understanding. They might be very cautious of using religious thought-forms or language. So chaplains need a special facility for such engagement.

All of this says that chaplaincy is a way for us to involve ourselves in a mission within secular institutions and to the whole of society. This is a huge opportunity.

But chaplaincy is also a slightly hidden ministry. Most people are amazed to find out that there are over 700 chaplains in the Methodist Church, divided broadly into eight disciplines – the Forces, Healthcare, Prisons, Workplace, Day Schools, Independent Schools, FE Colleges and HE Institutions. There are networks and coordinators to support each of these national teams and, increasingly, there are opportunities for cross-disciplinary exchange as well.

Recent developments include a casino chaplaincy, an extensive volunteer team in Bradford Magistrates' Court and a new focus on chaplaincy in Methodist Day Schools. We are even now seeking funding for a Connexional Chaplaincy Development Project to begin in 2010/2011.
