## Conferring well when living with contradictory convictions

# <u>Aim</u>

Learning how to live well with one another when we hold contradictory convictions, particularly regarding same-sex marriage.

# **Objectives**

- Seeing living with a range of contradictory convictions through spiritual and Biblical lenses
- Understanding Methodist conferring and decisions made
- Space to share our own experiences (testimony)
- Verbalising our own understanding of same-sex marriage through the lenses of scripture, what the Church tells us, what my own and others' stories tell us, what our reasoning tells us
- Expressing the missional and pastoral impacts of living well with contradictory convictions.

### <u>Methods</u>

- *Reinforce good listening skills*
- Agreeing how we will work together
- Engaging with the Bible
- Verbalising our own understanding
- Action planning

### When to, and not to, use this material

- When you know there are contradictory convictions in the congregation and you want to provide a starting point to learn to live with these differences
- This is not material to decide anything as a church, there is also <u>A step-by-step session</u> <u>outline</u> for church council decision on whether or not to register premises (England and Wales) for same-sex weddings

### Ways to use this material

- You might want to use elements of this outline, or all of them. If you use them all as laid out then there is a flow to them with integrated prayer and it could take two and half hours
- You might want to add breaks at times that suit the group.
- You might decide to share a meal together and use these ideas before or after.

Listening well	<ul> <li>In pairs</li> <li>One person speaks about a time they felt listened to. The speaker should try to use "I" to speak about their own thoughts, feelings and behaviour, and try to avoid generalisations or assumptions about others.</li> <li>Example: I felt listened to when I went to the GP because she asked me some questions to clarify what I was trying to describe. I was relieved to find out that there are some options</li> <li>Listener: summarise what you heard the speaker saying. If you are not sure, ask them if you heard that correctly.</li> <li>Swap roles</li> </ul>	Good practice – groundwork	10 mins

Living with differences well; the missional and pastoral impacts	<ul> <li>We can be Methodists and hold contradictory convictions.</li> <li>How we live with these differences of opinion is part of how we love one another and witness to the community.</li> <li>Is there anything we want to do as a congregation to strengthen the bonds between us?</li> <li>Is there anything we would like to offer to circuits to strengthen the bonds between us?</li> <li>Is there anything we would like to offer to the wider community, pastorally or in terms of service and mission, which can help people to live with contradictory views?</li> <li>Invite people to be creative.</li> <li>Possibly people could pick which of the three ideas to work on and in groups come up with three exciting ideas to share with the whole group.</li> <li>Help people come up with creative ideas such as snowball consensus, wishing (or hope) tree, sharing circle, graffiti wall and much more.</li> <li><i>If good ideas come, then commit to taking these to church council (or the relevant place).</i></li> </ul>	We can be Methodists and hold contradictory convictions.
