# Ecumenical Partnerships, Sharing Agreements, and Ecumenical Areas MC/22/64

Ecumenical relationships are going through a period of change brought by the Churches Together in England's document 'A Flexible Framework for Local Unity in Mission' and its accompanying Toolkit: <u>A</u> Flexible Framework for Local Unity in Mission – Churches Together in England (cte.org.uk) . These two documents help local churches to collaborate with one another with more flexibility, without necessarily establishing an LEP or putting in place a Sharing Agreement. As a consequence there has been a positive diversification of formats in which ecumenical relationships are created. This is dependent on the level of complexity the ecumenical projects require. Collaborations that require a less formal arrangement are managed locally. This is gaining pace.

More complex schemes might lead to a Constitutional Agreement, or even a Sharing Agreement based on the Sharing of Church Building Act 1969. When this is the case, Standing Order 334(5) requires all new schemes approved by the Synods under SO 412(2) and all Sharing Agreements authorised by the Ecumenical Officer, or by the Assistant Ecumenical Officer (AEO), to be reported to the Methodist Council. This Report contains the list of ecumenical schemes reported or the ones where there was direct involvement of the AEO.

Methodism – in collaboration with other denominations – has been encouraging a more flexible approach to ecumenical relationships and is directly involved in the writing of the Flexible Framework and its Toolkit. We are seeing the early fruits of this new approach, but the full consequences of it are still to be understood. The hope is that more flexibility will help people and churches to achieve what they would like to achieve without the bureaucracy that sometimes accompanies new ecumenical set ups. There is already a realisation that a balance needs to be struck between flexibility that makes ecumenical relations more agile and formality that makes them more prepared to face future storms.
