

Exploring fellowship



There is an African proverb that says, 'it takes a village to raise a child'. It points to the importance of supportive relationships to healthy personal development. That is also true of growing as a follower of Jesus: we could say that it takes a church to raise a disciple! In this session we will explore what it means to be part of God's family, helping one another to grow up to be like Jesus.



Connect: Share with the group

- If you could have a meal out with any person (living or from history) who would it be and why?
- 2. What have you done in terms of your 'action point' from the last meeting?
- 3. Who has been the biggest influence on your spiritual life?



Contemplate

- Before people arrive put a 'reserved' sign on one of the seats in the room. Keep the seat free during the 'Connect' time.
- 2. Tell people that this seat has been reserved for Jesus. Ask them to shut their eyes and in the silence, imagine that he is entering the room and sitting down to be with you.
- 3. While people's eyes are still closed, read John 20:19-20.
- 4. The first disciples were overjoyed to see Jesus. Ask people to think about how they would feel if they opened their eyes and saw Jesus in the room. Invite them to say silent prayers to him to express their feelings.
- 5. Pray together: Jesus, we welcome you here by your Spirit. Speak to us through the meeting of our lives. Amen.



Consider 1: Read Scripture

As in one body we have many limbs and organs ... so we, many as we are, are one body in Jesus, and individually we belong to one another. Well then, we have gifts that differ in accordance with the grace that has been given to us, and we must use them appropriately. If it is prophecy, we must prophesy according to the pattern of the faith. If it is serving, we must work at our serving; if teaching, at our teaching; if exhortation, at our exhortation; if giving, with generosity; if leading, with energy; if

doing acts of kindness, with cheerfulness.. Love must be real... be truly affectionate in showing love for one another; compete with each other in giving mutual respect... Give constant energy to prayer; contribute to the needs of God's people; make sure you are hospitable to strangers.

Wesley's wisdom

Solitary religion is not to be found [in the gospel of Christ]. 'Holy solitaries' is a phrase no more consistent with the gospel than holy adulterers. The gospel of Christ knows of no religion, but social; no holiness but social holiness...

This then is the way: walk in it, whosoever you are, that have believed in his name ... You are taught of God, 'not to forsake the assembling of yourselves together, as the manner of some is', but to instruct, admonish, exhort, reprove, comfort, confirm, and in every way 'build up one another'.

Consider 2: More about

- Jesus said that the crucial test of authentic discipleship is the love that we have for one another (John 13:34-35). The quality of our relationships, determines the effectiveness of our discipleship.
- The New Testament images of the Church point to the importance of our life together (living stones built together; different parts of one body; members of God's family...) These images go beyond just gathering for a 'Sunday meeting'.
- The New Testament emphasis on the importance of our life together includes an expectation that we teach one another, serve one another, encourage

one another, rebuke one another, confess our sins to one another, pray for one another, comfort one another... One-anothering is crucial to growing as a Christian disciple, and requires everyone to play their part.

- John Wesley released 'one-anothering' in early Methodism by organising fellowship in different size groups:
 - Society meetings a large group for worship and ministry, a bit like our congregations
 - Class meetings small groups, where people looked out for one another's personal and spiritual health
 - Band meetings even smaller groups where deep friendships could be formed for accountability and mutual spiritual help in growing as a disciple.
- The New Testament teaches that every Christian has a contribution to make to the growth of another. There are no 'spare parts' in the body of Christ.

- What potential is there in joining or forming – a small group for continuing fellowship after this course?
