The academic year at the Theological College is nearing the end, almost all exams will be completed by the end of the month. Then the students have a break but also have placements while the final year work on their theses.

Before Christmas I had the opportunity to travel to the north of the island to see the work of the Shalom Project to empower war widows and young people. This is led by Rev. Sumethra, with whom I was able to obtain a grant from Methodist Women in Britain (MWiB). I was keen to see how the money was used. The culmination of a two year programme with a group of village women is to provide them each with 10 young hens which will provide food and an income. What excitement on the day the hens were to arrive!

I also visited Jaffna at the north of the island and Trincomalle on the east coast. Wonderful scenery and beaches, amazing buildings but many reminders of the civil war which ended over ten years ago





Life at college continues as the New Principal seeks to build up the faculty staff who live on site. There have been several visitors from the UK including some from Queen's Foundation, Birmingham who wish to re establish strong links with the college here.

I enjoyed the visit of two friends from my home church in February. We visited a remote village church with the hope that we can support the work there. The current building was a shop and is at the roadside with the manse below and the chapel above.
