The past few months have provided me with a wide variety of experiences, some challenging, many humbling as I seek to do God's will on this wonderful island.

In July I returned to the UK for four weeks and managed to see family, friends, spend a couple of days at the Methodist Conference and visit my home church. It was wonderful to be part of the service in the recently refurbished worship area of Emmanuel, Ormskirk and on another occasion to meet Obeth and his family, Sri Lankans, part of the Tamil worshipping community in the Liverpool South Circuit.





This year I booked a seat to get a good view of the Esala Perahera in Kandy, noted as one of the most colourful religious pageants in Asia! There were many fire dancers, bands, dancers and elephants, the highlight being Buddha's tooth in a casket carried by an elephant. There were at least four sections to the parade each one had decorated their elephants in different coloured lights.





During August the Conference of the Methodist Church in Sri Lanka was held in Colombo. Rev. Patrick Evans, from the Southport Circuit, represented the Methodist Church in Britain. He and Louise managed to visit college for a couple of days.

The President/Bishop made a special award to one of our college students at Conference. Suren went to help at one of the bombed churches on Easter Day. He was close by, heard the explosion, and went to the church to help. He carried bodies to the mortuary and then helped with the post mortems.
