Reflection

Prayer is about the relationship that God has with us: the relationship at the heart of creation, made known in the patriarchs and the prophets, and written in human form, for all time, in Jesus.

Prayer is talking with God. It is a conversation with the Lord and, as with any other conversation, it creates an intimacy of understanding, building a trust that is laid on a foundation of love.

It is when we share with God all the aspects of our lives. The time we offer the adoration of our love, and our thanks for the depth of God's care for us and relationship with us; our thanks for the joy that is ours. It is the time when we recognise that the word 'sorry' is not enough as we search ourselves, who we are and what we have done, in the light of the wideness of God's love and all God has done for us in Christ.

It is the time when we talk to God about our concerns – from the small matters of our lives, home, family, work and relationships, to the wider interests of community. It is the time when we share the heavy weight of politics, power, money and the despair and tragedy of our world. It is a conversation with God. A conversation that, like any other conversation, changes us.

Reflection

For all God calls us and works with us as individuals, from the beginning God has been of 'a people'. The Bible is littered with words like people, a great nation, gather, they met together, and fellowship.

Now the LORD said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing."

Genesis 12:1-2 (NRSV)

For I know their works and their thoughts, and I am coming to gather all nations and tongues; and they shall come and see my glory.

Isaiah 66:18 (NRSV)

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts.

Acts 2:42, 46 (NRSV)

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body – Jews or Greeks, slaves or free – and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Reflection

So, if prayer is talking to God – the conversation that creates an intimacy of understanding, building a trust that is laid on a foundation of love – it cannot just be done in the singular. It has to be done in the plural.

It is a conversation in which that trust is not just built between an individual and God, but between all those who share our lives. Prayer is about being open to God, and it is God who enables us to be open to one another.

If we are not careful, we can fall into the trap of using the word conversation just as 'talking'.

Our prayer life builds our oneness with God, and our oneness with all those with whom we share our Christian journey. It is, of course, much more than that, for it lays down the foundation of God's kingdom.

For as God's people gather in prayerful fellowship together, we live out and bear witness to the life of the kingdom, when the nations and peoples of the world are gathered together as one under God's rule. Where there will be no Jew and Gentile, no black and white, no rich and poor, and when the boundaries of the whole earth will be drawn in God's love.
