Today's Gospel Reading: Matthew 11: 2-11

Time to Reflect (a poem)

What did you expect to see?

Asks Jesus,

Were you really looking for riches,

Jesus responds, and then speaks to the people about John. John has been faithful to his call, he has delivered his message, and he has seen the one he has spoken of.

So often we don't see as John saw, but are called to prepare a way for the kingdom to come both within our lives, and in the communities around us. How will you pray today? For your self, and for your community? How might you act to bring about God's kingdom, in a small way in your locality?

² When John heard in prison what the Messiah^[a] was doing, he sent word by his^[b] disciples ³ and said to him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?' ⁴ Jesus answered them, 'Go and tell John what you hear and see: ⁵ the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers^[c] are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. ⁶ And blessed is anyone who takes no offence at me.'

Jesus Praises John the Baptist

⁷ As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? ⁸ What then did you go out to see? Someone^[d] dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. ⁹ What then did you go out to see? A prophet?^[e] Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. ¹⁰ This is the one about whom it is written,

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you."

¹¹ Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.

⁷ As John's disciples were leaving, Jesus began to speak to the crowd about John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swayed by the wind? ⁸ If not, what did you go out to see? A man dressed in fine clothes? No, those who wear fine clothes are in kings' palaces. ⁹ Then what did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. ¹⁰ This is the one about whom it is written:

"'I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you.'[c]
